February Fellowship and Webelos Crossover Weekend

The February Fellowship Webelos Crossover and Weekend will be held February 21 - 23, 2014 at Camp Karankawa. The fee for the event will be \$15 provided your registration and fees are received in the Council Office no later than Monday, February 17th. A \$10 late fee will be assessed if you do not register early and pay by the early registration deadline. If you are unable to stay for the entire weekend, a \$10 day rate will apply provided your registration and payment is received at the Council Office by the early registration deadline; otherwise, a \$10 late fee will apply at the door.

The Fellowship will get underway Friday evening with registration in the Dinning Hall beginning at 6:30 p.m., Chapter Dancing & Singing Competition will be held at the Carter Campfire Circle from 8:00 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. A cracker Barrel and Brotherhood Induction Ceremony will follow the competitions at the Dining Hall.



A Webelos Crossover Ceremony will be held on Saturday afternoon at the Carter Campfire Circle. As part of the crossover program, we will offer Scout Rank Jump Start and New Parent Introduction to Scouting specifically for Webelos crossing over into Boy Scouts.

Saturday will be filled with a full day of Native American related classes for the young and old. A few highlights of the planned sessions include:

Karankawa Lodge Vigil Honor Class of 2013

Karankawa Lodge proudly conferred the Vigil Honor upon six Brothers during the December Fellowship and Vigil Weekend. The Vigil Honor is a high mark of distinction and recognition reserved for those Arrowmen who, by reason of exceptional service, personal effort, and unselfish interest, have made distinguished contributions beyond the immediate responsibilities of their position or office to one or more of the following: their Lodge, the Order of the Arrow, Scouting, or their Scout Camp. Under no circumstances is tenure in Scouting or the Order of the Arrow considered as reason enough for a Vigil Honor recommendation.

The Vigil Honor is the highest honor that the Order of the Arrow can bestow upon its members for service to their Lodge, Council, and Scouting. It dates from the year 1915, when founder E. Urner Goodman became the first Vigil Honor member. Vigil Honor members have an honorable tradition to uphold. They must at all times conduct themselves in accordance with the ideals of Scouting, the Order of the Arrow, and the Vigil Honor. Membership cannot be won by a person's conscious endeavor. It comes as a recognition of unselfish leadership in service. This fact is given in careful consideration in the selection of candidates for membership. Members of the Order can be inducted into the Vigil Honor only with the written approval of the National Order of the Arrow Committee.

As part of the Vigil induction process, candidates are bestowed with a Vigil name. The name represents a characteristic of the individual that has made themselves well known to others. The name is given in the language of the Lenape.

During the December Fellowship Lodge and Vigil Honor Recognition Dinner, Lodge Chief Johnathan Luna, presented the Founder's Award to Alex Call and JJ Cabrera. Lodge Staff Advisor James Rangel Presented the Founder's Award to Assistant Scout Executive Marty Sepulveda.

Introduced at the 1981 National Order of the Arrow Conference, the Founder's Award was created to honor and recognize those Arrowmen who have given outstanding service to their Lodge. The award is reserved for those Arrowmen who memorialize their everyday life, the spirit of achievement as described by founder E. Urner Goodman.

Alex, JJ, and Marty were presented a certificate, Founder's

Award recognition ribbon, and a bronze medallion bearing the images of founder E. Urner Goodman and cofounder Carroll A. Edson. The reverse of the medallion is inscribed, "For he who serves his fellows, is of all his fellows, greatest," which was Goodman's primary purpose in founding the Order of the Arrow.

JJ Cabrera is an Eagle Scout of Troop 361 and a Vigil Honor member of Karankawa Lodge. He has been involved in Scouting for ten years taking on many challenges, leadership opportunities and responsibilities. JJ served two terms as Lodge Secretary after previously serving as a Chapter Chief and on various LEC committees. He eventually became involved on the Section level. JJ has participated at the Section SR2-3S Lonestar Fellowship as well as serving on various committees within the Section. In 2012, JJ competed at the National Order of the Arrow Conference as a member of the Pre-Ordeal Ceremony Team which was chosen to be of the top ten ceremony teams in the nation. Aside from the Order of the Arrow, JJ has spent a countless hours staffing many events across the South Texas Council. He has participated on NYLT staff for

From the Staff Advisor

Several times this year when promoting Order of the Arrow to leaders, I have been asked a simple question "Why would I want to be in OA?" I don't believe the answer is so simple but I will try to explain it.

When one begins a story with the phrase "I remember one time....." the rest of the story usually has to do with Scouting and sometimes the Order of the Arrow. The Order of the Arrow was founded upon the principles of Brotherhood, ceremony and unselfish service. Arrowmen wear their sash with pride and as a symbol of those who are willing to serve. Those that are elected are considered the best campers and display their skills through leadership and their willingness to always jump in and help when needed.

The Order of the Arrow has always had a mystique about it that creates memories and provides Scouts and Scouters with a different experience, but also the opportunity to grow spiritually and emotionally. Much of what is presented in the OA is an internal examination and reflection of one's own being. What you choose to take from it is up to you. Some zombie through the Ordeal, endure the ceremony, gather their patch and sash, and disappear-never to be seen again. Others take to heart what is being challenged by the great Allowat Sekema, and move forward to contribute to the greater good of the Scouting movement and world in which we live. Just because we are not wearing our uniform and sash, doesn't mean we aren't acting like Scouts. The OA is one of those experiences that changes who we are for the better. Ask an older member of the OA and their explanation might be similar to the one above, but most importantly it's about the folks involved in the OA. They help create the brotherhood and experience that keeps the fire glowing bright within us to serve as a beacon of light to guide in this sometimes dark world.

I don't know if this answers the question, but hopefully it sheds some light on some folks experience. I say come out and find out for yourself, not just once or twice but be active for a year and get your unit active. You just might be surprised at what you discover.

Attention All Registered Ordeal Members!

Attention all registered Ordeal Members! You may now seal your membership in the Order if you have continued faithfully to serve and have completed the following requirements:

- Completed ten months of unit service as an Ordeal member;
- Maintained your registered membership in Scouting;
- Maintained your registered membership in the Order of the Arrow;
- Memorized the Obligation, the Order of the Arrow Official Song, the Admonition, the sign of Ordeal Membership, and the Arrow handclasp;
- Gained a through understanding of the Ordeal through which you have passed (See "The Customs and Traditions of the Ordeal" in the <u>Order of the Arrow Handbook</u>.)

It is important that you not only meet the above requirements, but that you feel that you are prepared for the Brotherhood. Write a letter to the Lodge Secretary expressing you feelings.

In your letter:

- Explain what you think the Obligation means;
- Describe how you have been fulfilling this Obligation in your Troop or Team and in your daily life, and how you have used your understanding of the Ordeal to aid in your service; and
- Describe your specific plans for giving future service to the Lodge program.

Your next opportunity to become a Brotherhood member is at the Karankawa Lodge Fellowship and Webelos Crossover Weekend during the weekend of February 21st-23rd at Camp Karankawa. You must pass the Brotherhood requirements prior to undertaking the Brotherhood. This may be accomplished by either being pre-tested by your local Chapter Adviser prior to this opportunity, or by the Brotherhood Committee at the event.




